



# Chronic Condition Coding Awareness: Autistic Disorder

### Autistic Disorder

Autism is a brain disorder that limits a person's ability to communicate and relate to other people<sup>2</sup>. Also known as autism spectrum disorder (ASD), the term "spectrum" reflects the wide variation in challenges and strengths possessed by each person<sup>1</sup>. Some people can navigate their world, some have exceptional abilities, while others struggle to speak<sup>2</sup>.

### Symptoms of Autism

Signs of ASD tend to appear between 2 and 3 years of age and can include repeated motions and/or words, avoiding eye contact or physical touch, delays in learning to talk, and getting upset by minor changes<sup>2</sup>. Additionally, some people with autism can experience physical symptoms such as constipation, sleep problems, poor coordination of muscles, and seizures<sup>2</sup>. These signs, however, can also occur in children without ASD and at any age<sup>1 2</sup>. It is important that caregivers talk with a healthcare provider to request a screening for autism.

## Treatment of Autism

Treatment for ASD is dependent on screening results. A diagnosis of autism is not needed for people to begin receiving services related to developmental delays or learning challenges<sup>1</sup>. Nonetheless treatments offered include behavior programs, individualized education program (IEP), medication, sensory processing, assistive technology, and diet<sup>2</sup>.

Avoid terms such as "history of"	if patient is still being monitored for the condition. <u>Incorrect</u> wording: Patient has <u>history of</u> autism. <u>Correct</u> wording: Patient has autism and continues medication.
Documentation & Coding Tips	<ul> <li>The following language supports actively monitoring [any] condition and must be documented by the provider. In the documentation, mention</li> <li>if the patient is receiving therapy.</li> <li>getting a refill on medication.</li> <li>the status of the condition.</li> </ul>
